

Minister's Letter

A restful summer?

I ended my last newsletter saying "I for one am looking forward to the lightness of the August Diary to catch up on things that have slipped over the past few weeks, and also to spend more time praying and 'being' in the presence of God." Well, August came and although the diary looked light with regards to meetings, there was still a lot to be done. All of this was heightened by our impeding holiday – the first trip outside the British isles we had made for well over a decade. Looking back the process of booking tickets, checking in online, packing our cases and going was quite straightforward, but at the time it seemed to be a mountain we had to climb. A few days before we flew we wondered whether it was all worth it!

Of course July was not a restful month either. We began it with Tricia tripping and fracturing her elbow – on the way to a party. This put her off work for the rest of the term and unable to drive. Luckily it was "a perfect fracture" and did not require anything other than a lightweight sling and a lot of patience. The following week I was on my way to conduct the Friday morning communion service at Gregory Boulevard when I was run into from behind at the Hucknall Road traffic lights on Haydn Road. This made a mess of the back of our little Kia which we lost for the rest of the month to our Insurance companies repair shop (in Chesterfield). No physical damage to me as I saw it coming in the rear view mirror and was able to prepare myself.

July – August is a time when ministers try to complete those little administrative jobs that have piled up in the

'in tray'. I think I managed to complete one – that was with Norman Parr to complete the fire risk assessment. This requires two people to walk around the premises with a check list and look for things that might cause or exacerbate a fire and check all exits and exit routes are accessible and clear. We also checked at the same time the fire alarm and emergency lights. This was all written up into a report, which the elders have to approve, listing observations and any actions required.



The holiday – when we got there – was wonderful. Eleven long days around the Bay of Naples, based in Sorrento. We visited Museums, Cathedrals, Greek Temples, Capri, Pompeii, Herculaneum,

walked round the still smouldering crater of Vesuvius, and got lost in Naples (almost!) all in the summer heat of 32°C or more. By the end we were well and truly relaxed, and did not want to come back!

Big things in September

But come back we did, straight into September with its mountain of meetings, and three 'big' events. The first of these was about 12 hours after we had arrived home – the Birthday party of Margaret Sharman. Carol has written about this later in the magazine.

The second was the baptism of Pippa Inman. It was a big event for me because it was the first Believers Baptism I had ever conducted, so Pippa was my Guinea Pig! I found it very moving, not least because of Pippa's

'statement' which told us a little about her faith journey. It is not often that we hear a 'testimony' in our church, and so I have sought Pippa's permission to reproduce it later in this magazine.

The third big event, a week later, was the occasion of the Thanksgiving, Blessing and Dedication of Kaleb Andrew Junior Thomas. I have conducted many of these so it was almost routine (almost, since they are all unique and tailored as far as possible to the family bringing the child), but it was 'big' in that we expected up to forty guests and actually had around eighty, many coming from as far away as Birmingham (in a coach!). It was wonderful to see the church so full (the screens were opened), it was good to see quite a number of folk not used to church. I hope we made a good impression and were able to share the love of God with them – I am sure we showed them that the URC (and Sherwood URC in particular) is quite different from what they might 'imagine' church to be like. Thank you everyone!

And so we begin a new 'year' in the church. Harvest, Remembrance and Christmas are all ahead of us (and I am already looking forward to the lightness of the January diary . . . !). All our regular activities are starting up – Prime Time, Chill Out, Light Refreshments, Talking on the Way (TOW). The prayer life of our congregation is growing: we already have a rota of members leading our intercessions on a Sunday Morning, and we are trying to establish the third Sunday as a time for Prayer for Healing and Wholeness after the morning service. So it is good that, in TOW we have arrived at the Emmaus Course Session of Prayer. Please, everyone, make this session a priority to attend.

Prayer

We started TOW in September, but as there were only a few of use we did not use the course material, but looked more generally at Prayer. We began by sharing what we thought Prayer is: it is - communication with God, - thanking, -an expression of our desire, - asking for things: for strength to cope, for understanding what God wants us to do, listening(or at least trying to), - not just sitting down and thinking words.

We admitted that prayer brought along some problems: why doesn't God do something about it? Is God Listening, is God even there? Has God got better things to do than sort out my questions? In reality, what can we ask? All of which led us on to thinking 'does Prayer work?' We decided that it does help the person who is praying, that is was more like a chat with a friend – but our minds do wander.

Our discussion meandered a little – especially into the idea of 'original sin' and what really is in 'Christianity' and in 'our tradition'. We were amazed that we agreed in our reasoning with Peter Baelz, an Oxford professor and Dean of Durham, in that prayer is more about being in the presence of God rather than invoking the power of God. We wondered if this would line up with the Emmaus Course. Come along on Wed 8th October, 2.30 to find out!

In the Steps of the Saints (Part 2 - Rome)



We arrived in Rome just after a hail storm but the next morning it was dry and sunny. On our first day we visited the Catacombs of San Callistro, the first official cemetery of the Christian community in Rome. Early Christian symbols and biblical images could be seen on the walls.

Rome is full of impressive churches. The Basilica of St Paul Outside the Walls was built over

the burial place of St Paul. It has a towering marble statue of St Paul in the courtyard and the exterior is decorated with beautiful mosaics. When we entered the Church there was a mass being said and it ended with a bit of the Halleluiah Chorus. The ceiling was very decorative and around the edge there are mosaic portraits of all the Popes from St Peter onwards.

Another site associated with St Paul is the Mamertime Prison Museum. Tradition suggests that both Peter and Paul may have been held here. Legend says that Peter or Paul caused a well to spring up in the prison and the water was used to baptise the prison guards.

Visits were made to the Basilica of Santa Maria Maggiore which is dedicated to the Virgin Mary and the Basilica of St John Lateran. Above the Basilica of St John Lateran there are 15 large white statues of Jesus, John Articles 13

the Baptist and other saints. Inside there are twelve larger than life-size sculptures of the Apostles.

A highlight of our stay in Rome was a visit to the Vatican Museums.

After doing a very brief tour of some of the many, many rooms, we made our way to the Sistine Chapel which is accessed via the museums. The ideal way to view the ceiling would be to lie down and gaze up at it



but there are too many visitors for this to be possible. Visitors inside the chapel are not allowed to take photographs and are also requested to be silent but during our brief time in the chapel I found it quite noisy and it did not feel the spiritual place I had expected. However, the ceiling and walls are magnificent and did not disappoint.

After leaving the Vatican Museums, Doreen and I wandered along to St Peter's Square. We didn't go inside the Basilica as the queues were very long and we had both been inside on other holidays. During the time we were in the Museums there had been a Papal Audience outside in front of the Basilica, so everywhere was very busy.

One day of our visit was spent visiting the Colosseum, the Arch of Constantine and the Forum. Paul was probably familiar with the Forum area as this was the market place. On our last morning we did the usual

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tourist "must see bits" and saw the Trevi Fountain and the Spanish Steps. : *Arrivederci* Roma
