

If November is a time for Remembering – then so is December!

First of all we remember the Birth of Jesus - although I think we ought to do a little more checking up on the story that we think we remember! The Christmas story is so appealing that it has got itself elaborated and conflated in our minds. Only Matthew and Luke record anything about Jesus birth, and their stories are different. We overlook the differences, roll the two into one, invent an Inn with a stable and add some Christmas trimmings to get the familiar "Nativity".

But it is what lies behind the Nativity story that we really should be remembering – and Mark, in the introduction to his Gospel, puts it bluntly and with no elaboration

"The beginning of the gospel about Jesus Christ, the Son of God."

We remember the birth of Jesus because it is the entering of God into the world as a human being. It is all about God becoming intimate with us.

Christmas is also a time of remembering our friends near and far. The ritual we use to embody this is that huge chore of writing all those Cards! If your list is anything like our list it includes a good number of family members and old friends who you would have lost touch with if it weren't for Christmas, together with some old friends who have played some significant part in your life.

Christmas is also a time of remembering your own story – you are who you are because of your family and your friends. You are who you are because of the God who came to earth in Jesus the Christ.

He created you, he loves you, and he died for you.

MEMORIES

As I grow older I often find myself thinking back to the halcyon days of my childhood when my Parents developed in me the lasting joy of walking in the countryside. As the year unfolded we just set off to find the first snowdrops in early Spring, followed by the shy, elusive wild violets then cowslips and wild orchids and finally big plump juicy blackberries in Fishpool woods.

Two particular outings which I often enjoyed are especially clear in my memories. The first is going by trolley 'bus to take a walk over the suspension bridge and through Clifton Grove which was full of the loveliest old trees which cast welcome shade on a very warm day. According to my old book of well known Nottingham places these trees were planted about 1740.

How pleasant it was then to be rowed over the river to Barton for 2d before walking along the tow-path to Beeston Rylands where a visit to friends for a welcome drink and sit-down completed the pleasure of the afternoon.

An annual Easter outing (whatever the weather) which is very clear in my mind involved going by train to Lowdham then walking by the river and over the fields to Hoveringham where once again we visited friends. They kept chickens. On one occasion I remember being told to find any eggs that had been laid that day and I could have

one for my tea. The very best egg ever!
It was usually dusk as we returned by an alternative route, walking over fields to catch the returning train at Gonalston. This was quite magical on a moonlit night when grass shone in a silvery light, owls hooted in the distance and the odd one flew nearby.

Never, by the way, believe anyone who says it won't snow as late as Easter. I remember sitting on top of a gate eating ham sandwiches in a snowstorm en route to Hoveringham!

BEETHOVEN BY BIKE (the latest extracts taken from Jenny's notes – she is the daughter of a previous church secretary, and is cycling through Europe)

At the time of writing Jenny was staying with a friend on the island of Adelso, lake Malaron on the west side of Stockholm. "Throughout my journey in Sweden, weaves the thread of Viking history, wonderful nature, "trolls" (I did actually see one) and just yesterday I rowed with friends across the 800m stretch of water separating Adelso from Birka to see a fantastic reconstruction of a viking village, complete with small homes with their hearths and sheepskin-clad sleeping benches and a small fleet of ships, lying in the nearby shallows. From warm-hearted handshakes and laughing, impossible-tofatham directions to awkward embarrassment (I was woefully intrusive because I was so curious) ..spacious open farmland with regular, ribboned crucifixes or great stretches of forest, villages and small towns with impeccable paving suddenly disappearing into potholes or dirt.....shopping places that look more like containers with elaborate grills (do they hope to keep the contents a secret?) Well heeled areas with secure gates and fences. Then such an uplifting sight – bridge over the Wista in late afternoon sun, with Wtoctawek lit up and lovely. The Communists have left their mark easily recognised in its uniformity, - Cuba, Kyrgzstan- Poland, but they can't change nature or people's temperaments. I feel so grateful and honoured to be able to see all this."
